Meeting Notes

Club President Glenn Maleyko led today's meeting, which opened with the singing of the National Anthem. Invocation was done by PP Bob Gleichauf and was a prayer giving thanks, which mentioned unexpected blessings. Today's guests were Dearborn Police Chief Ronald Haddad (today's speaker) plus repeat guest Tameka Spruce from Beaumont Hospital (guest of Jessica Haddad).

Announcements

PP Bob Gleichauf said Santa Snaps set will be moved back to storage unit on Saturday, 1-19-2019. Please volunteer for this project.

President Glenn thanked PN Colleen Nieman and PE Eric Rader for subbing for him while he has been away. Appreciates positive culture our Club Board has and good team work. Youth Month is coming for four meetings in February and Shannon Peterson is organizing. Tentatively a Club Visioning project is planned for a dinner meeting in March.

Merritt Robertson reports we are at 30% of our \$7,000. goal for 2018-2019 Rotary International Foundation fundraising. 25% of our members have contributed and Merritt said fundraising bank (Merritt) is open 24/7.

Rick Goward encouraged us to attend Big Band, Bop & Pop Concert on Saturday, January 26, 2019 at 8 PM at Ford Performing Arts Center. It is a Dearborn Rotary "no brainer" fundraiser. By attending and/or sponsoring you are raising money for Dearborn Rotary. Need your reservations (if you want to be recognized in program) by next Thursday (1-17-2019). Janice Gilliland's husband is preparing a concert after glow food spread for Rotarians. Nine members so far have bought tickets.

Margaret Blohm announced our guest Sameil from Cairo, Egypt Rotary Club. Sameil said he celebrates Rotarians everywhere he travels. President Glenn and Sameil traded Rotary Club banners.

50/50 raffle was led by Martha Hnatiuk today. Chief Haddad drew winning ticket and David Anderson was winner of \$9.

Shannon Peterson said 150 Birmingham Seaholm high school students visited Fordson High School this past week to learn more about Muslim students. Students from both schools had a great time visiting and found out they have more similarities than differences. Shannon said her son was recently promoted to a homicide detective and loves his career in Detroit Police Department.

Madeline Hnatiuk (Martha's granddaughter) outgoing exchange student in Germany just moved to her second host family. Local German Rotary Club said Madeline Hnatiuk was best German speaking exchange student who has visited them. Madeline first host family gave her a key to their home and told her to come back and visit anytime.

PE Eric Rader was glad to be here and missed Rotary meetings last semester due to a class scheduling conflict. Eric said there will be no class scheduling conflicts during his Dearborn Rotary Presidential year.

President Glenn is happy Chief Haddad is here.

Dearborn Police Chief Ronald Haddad has been in law enforcement for 44 years and has worked in Dearborn since 2008. Dearborn is recognized nationally for its Arab community and in Summer of 2015, Mayor O'Reilly, Chief Haddad and Supt Glenn attended a government conference in Washington D.C. regarding the positive community relations.

Chief Haddad complimented Shannon's son on his detective achievement at such young age plus his recent Detroit Police medal of valor award. He noted her son was a former Dearborn Police Explorer.

There was a 9.7% reduction in Dearborn crime this past year and 25% reduction over past two years. Dearborn Police Department has 250 great men and women officers who are well trained. Dearborn Police visit Dearborn schools 600 to 800 times per month unannounced. New state of art communications center in Dearborn is providing police dispatch for region at an equitable share of cost for communities served. Crime is regional. Robbers, rapists and armed individuals are not limited to one community. Several years ago Dearborn Police learned of armed individual in an adjacent community via a newscast rather than police sources. New regional dispatch center eliminates that problem. Dearborn Police were prepared recently for an armed individual, whose crimes started in Melvindale. Lack of communication between police departments slowed capture of a serial rapist several years ago who was preying on multiple communities.

Dearborn Police took 400 weapons off the street this past year. 700 felons were arrested past year via traffic stops. Dearborn Police received 70,000 calls last year, wrote 40,000 tickets, worked 3,600 car crashes, arrested 800 individuals, and only applied force slightly less than 40 times. Dearborn Police training reduces incidents of applied force.

Rotary supported "Lock or Loose-It" program works in reducing thefts from automobiles. Fairlane Town Center is a safe mall. Dearborn Police, mall security plus Ford security are active there. Prior to Ford's decision to reinvest \$2 billion in Dearborn facilities, company had multiple meetings with mayor, police chief, local schools and universities to determine future of Dearborn.

Dearborn Police Explorers is a good program and participants are role models for the community. Scouts have gone on to serve as police officers, military, naval academy, and other legal roles. Mayor O'Reilly kept Explorer program going even in financially distressing times. Some Explorers become interns and earn an hourly wage and have some college tuition reimbursement.

Mental illness is a huge problem for police officers and Dearborn officers are specially trained to deal with it. Individuals do not comprehend commands police are giving them. Dearborn has a voluntary special needs register where families can register individuals suffering from autism, mental illness, and addiction. Police will have this information prior to visiting residence. Opioid crisis is causing many deaths and Dearborn Police are trained to inject Narcan.

It is getting difficult to find quality police officers. Many people are not interested in going into public service due to cut-backs. Dearborn Police have been recognized locally and around the country for best policing practices.

Dearborn Police partner with ACCESS and First Step to help individuals dealing with domestic violence. Dearborn Police take a holistic approach to serving domestic abuse victims and still have Teddy Bear and Coats for Kids program. Officers appreciate Adopt-Cop-Program and recognition they are human like everyone else. Appreciate large Dearborn Police response to quickly find young grandson who decided to go visit local park on his own. I have an "I Love Dearborn Police" poster in my kitchen. Thank you for your well-trained diverse police officers. We have 100,000 residents and 200,000 people visit Dearborn daily. All are treated with same equality and fairness. Chief said he is not related to Jessica, but would claim her as a relative.

President Glenn thanked Chief Ronald Haddad and we closed our Dearborn Rotary Club meeting by reciting the Four-Way Test.
