Dearborn Rotary Scholarship Gala is Tuesday, 4-18-2017, at Henry Ford College Welcome Center, **Lee Hollmann** announced. Dinner starts at 6:00 PM, but Lee encouraged Dearborn Rotarians to be there at 5:00 PM to act as hosts. Spouses and guests are welcome. There is no Thursday lunch meeting (4-20-2017) that week. Prepaid lunch members do not pay any additional amount for the scholarship dinner. Cost is \$15. per person for everyone else. Dearborn Rotary is awarding 23 scholarships totaling about \$50,000. Janice Gilliland led the 50/50 raffle today. Neil Allen was the winner of \$15.

Today's meeting was a Club Assembly because our guest speaker was ill. Club discussed high profile projects to be funded by our Dearborn Rotary Foundation. PE Bob Gleichauf led the discussion of possible projects. Foundation has money available for a local project.

Club is looking for a project with main street exposure to promote Dearborn Rotary. Please contact David Anderson, Regan Ford, or Bob Gleichauf with suggestions.

Community Service Director **David Anderson** has been chairing a committee researching proposed projects. He read an e-mail to the Club from the curator at the Dearborn Historical Museum. The museum is looking for money for an exterior wood repair and lead abatement project at the McFadden-Ross House. Other suggested projects gathered by the Club committee included bicycle racks in Downtown West Dearborn, benches along proposed Dearborn bike trails, barrier free playground equipment, and a food bank project with Westborn Kroger store. At least \$10,000 is available for a project.

Stan Jensen mentioned Henry Ford College has a food bank operated by the students. It serves 100 students per week. Today's guest, Sara Gleicher, is the project manager for Healthy Dearborn, a joint project with City of Dearborn and Beaumont Healthcare. She described a generous donation from owner's of Dearborn Sausage Company and Beaumont Foundation is providing funding for bike paths through Dearborn. A bike share program is also proposed with five bike stations. Merritt Robertson said recent City newsletter has a good description of proposed bicycle paths.

PE Bob Gleichauf shared a proposed project from Emma Jean Woodyard and the Dearborn Community Arts Council. An outdoor music performance stage is proposed in front of Old City Hall. Naming rights might be available.

Roger Miller proposed erecting a shade canopy at our Kingfisher Bluff project at Henry Ford College. Existing deck has benches but open exposure makes location very hot for seating.

Kathy Kalil suggested Dearborn Rotary fund a positive video promoting Dearborn. Video would coun-

ter-act some of the negative publicity Dearborn has received past several years.

Lee Hollmann said the Dearborn Historical Museum is one of Dearborn's best kept secrets. He suggested we could install a digital sign at Michigan Avenue and Brady Street to promote the museum.

A show of hands vote was done for the proposed projects. We were each allowed to vote on three different projects. Proposed projects included: museum renovation, bike racks/bike stations, old city hall performance venue, Kingfisher Bluff canopy, food bank with Kroger, Rotary video, handicap accessible playground equipment, and museum sign. Bike racks/bike stations, Kingfisher Bluff canopy, and old city hall performance venue were most heavily favored by Club members.

Dearborn Rotary Foundation Secretary, Merritt Robertson, said foundation is encouraging Club to leverage the money. Foundation suggests we involve two other Rotary Clubs in Dearborn to obtain a District Grant. Merritt reminded us of "every Rotarian every year" regarding our Rotary International Foundation donations. We need to meet our Club donation goal to obtain District grants.

Rotary meeting ended with us reciting the Four-Way Test in unison

Some Rotary Firsts

- The first Rotary club meeting was in Chicago, Illinois, on February 23, 1905.
- The first regular luncheon meetings were in Oakland, California, chartered in 1909.
- The first Rotary convention was in Chicago in 1910.
- The first Rotary club outside of the U.S. was chartered in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, in 1910.
- The first Rotary club in our District was the Rotary Club of Detroit, chartered in 1910.
- The first Rotary club outside of North America was chartered in Dublin, Ireland, in 1911.
- The first Rotary club in South America was chartered in Montevideo, Uruguay, in 1918.
- The first Rotary club in Asia was chartered in Manila, Philippines, in 1919.
- The first Rotary club in Africa was chartered in Johannesburg, South Africa, in 1921.
- The first Rotary club in Australia was chartered in Melbourne in 1921.
- The first Rotary club in Northern California was chartered in Eureka in 1923.

The first Rotary club to be organized outside an English-speaking country was established in Havana, Cuba, April 29, 1916, with 22 charter members. The club was admitted to Rotary on June 1, 1916.

During 1923, the Rotary Club of Havana celebrated its seventh anniversary, in what became a very busy year. The club sponsored a carnival attended by more than 1,500 children, won a prohibition against bullfighting in Cuba, worked to get the city's water sanitized and properly purified, and obtained pavement repairs in certain areas.

By October 1957 we saw some 60 chartered Rotary clubs there. All clubs in Cuba were terminated by January 31, 1979.

We need to remember that it was RI who shut down the Rotary Clubs in Cuba and not the government there. The grounds used were that all countries that restrict free speech and freedom of assembly could not have clubs. So, either Cuba must change or RI must change before Rotary Clubs will reappear in Cuba. Since Rotary is back in E. Europe, China and Russia, there is reason to hope.
