She recently participated in a 23-day tour of many of the major cities in Europe. Happy to be here today. Had a great experience today at a church with DPS outreach program. Dearborn Public Schools recently did three presentations at a national conference plus a presentation for State Board of Education.

David C. Brunell, Esq. has been a practicing attorney for 30 years and grew up in South Dearborn Heights. He has expertise in probate and estate planning and likes to be a proactive attorney in a reactive industry. Legal fees are lower when you are proactive rather than reactive. His presentation was on legal-life parachutes about what you need to know to avoid future legal-life time bombs and whether you have an estate plan or not. David had ten non-legal plans every one of us should prepare, five of them can be done without an attorney. Information packets about David and his program were on our tables.

Cost of handling an estate through Wayne County Probate Court is typically 5% to 6% of estate. 78% of us have failed to prepare estate plans. Having just a will is not estate planning, you still end-up in probate court. Sometimes your affairs end-up in probate court pre-death due to incapacity issues. Getting authorization to handle another's affairs through probate court costs and takes a minimum of \$3,500. and 90 days.

Some things you can do to make your estate planning easier for your heirs include: organize basic information (birth certificate, assets, passwords to your electronic/digital life), create a trust or a will, coordinate your insurance beneficiaries for estate planning, pre-death planning and vital statistics sheet (funeral homes are a good source pre-death information you should gather), leave a legacy plan, and create a trust (it is just a box and you still have to put stuff and beneficiaries in trust).

Bob Gleichauf, Colleen Nieman, Rick Goward, Margaret Blohm, Regan Ford and David Anderson all had questions or comments. Vital statistics includes your background info. and such things as your mother's maiden name, father's hometown, etc. Vital statistic category information sheets are available. Personal contact information and incapacitated person's social security numbers are other vital statistics. One way to gift personal belongings is to write, sign and date a letter listing items and to whom you are donating them. If you create a trust, make sure you put everything into it. Trusts are not always necessary. You can do estate planning via a ladybird deed and careful coordination of beneficiaries of your assets. Create a probate avoidance will. TV show "Better Call Saul" is probably a conglomeration of 100 attorneys. Attorneys are usually winners in estates where there has been no estate planning. Some local celebrities died without planning their estate and legal fees have been large.

President Glenn Maleyko thanked David C. Brunell, Esq. for his presentation and invited him to sign a children's book to be donated to Dearborn Public Library. Dearborn Rotary Club meeting closed with us reciting the Four-Way Test in unison.
